Today's Forecast: Stormy with a Chance of Patience

Here in New England we have a saying: If you don't like the weather, wait a minute. It will change.

When I moved to the Midwest, I learned they have the same saying. And it's true. I've seen the temperature flip from near 80 to below freezing in a matter of hours. I've witnessed rain, snow, and sunshine all in a single day. Change can happen quickly.

I've also learned something else. Unlike the weather, matters of relationship, self-improvement, and personal challenges do not change so



This month brings the fourth detailed explanation of the sacrament of Holy Baptism. Within this section, Luther will explain what baptism by water means to us as Christians.

4. What Baptism Indicates Fourth

What does such baptizing with water indicate?

It indicates that the Old Adam in us should by daily contrition and repentance be drowned and die with all sins and evil desires, and that a new man should daily emerge and arise to live before God in right-eousness and purity forever.

Where is this written?

St. Paul writes in Romans chapter six: "We were therefore buried with

rapidly. These matters take perseverance. And patience.

Patience is a fruit of the Spirit. Like physical fruit, spiritual fruit does not suddenly manifest. It needs to be grown under the right conditions. Unfortunately, the right conditions for growing patience may feel more like a hurricane than a soft summer rain.

A man once asked his pastor to pray for him to develop patience. Dutifully the pastor launched into an earnest prayer. "Lord, give this young man conflict and hardship at every turn. Litter his path with frustrating delays, unexpected obstacles, and personalities very different than his own."

Indeed, patience is not something we typically receive fully formed. It is a character trait developed slowly. Ironically, we learn patience while learning patience. It is only when we are in situations that require patience that we learn how to develop it.

Reading about patience, studying God's Word, and even receiving God's Spirit is not the same

The Old Adam is the corrupt and evil nature that we inherit because of Adam's fall into sin.

867 Eph. 4:22 Put off, concerning your former conduct, the old man which grows corrupt according to the deceitful lusts (NKJV).

256. How is this Old Adam to be drowned in us?

The Old Adam is to be drowned by daily contrition (sorrow for sins) and repentance (faith), by which we resist and overcome evil desires.

868 **Luke 9:23** If anyone would come after Me, he must deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow Me.

869 **Gal. 5:24** Those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the sinful nature with its passions and desires.

257. What is the new man?

The new man is the new spiritual life and nature, created in us by the washing of

thing as exhibiting patience. The Bible warns we need to be careful to not hear God's Word and think that is the culmination. If we believe that, we deceive ourselves (see James 1:22). God's Word is not the end, but the beginning. It is the seed which through trials, tribulations, and our own perseverance develops into the full fruit of patience.

James (5:7) gives an example when he urges us, "See how the farmer waits for the land to yield its valuable crop and how patient he is for the autumn and spring rains."

Unlike the fast-changing weather I am used to, James was using an illustration from a part of the world that could undergo weeks, even months, with little to no rain. They did not have forecasters to give a 10-day weather outlook or an hour-by-hour prediction. Much more like the unpredictable changes we face in other areas of our life, these farmers had to prepare their fields and learn patience as they faced each day not knowing

258. How is this new man to emerge and arise?

The new man emerges and arises as we daily live and grow before God in true faith and good works.

871 **Eph. 4:24** Put on the new man which was created according to God, in righteousness and true holiness (NKJV).

259. How does Baptism indicate the daily drowning of the Old Adam and the emergence of the new man?

By Baptism we have been made to share in Christ's death and resurrection. As He has buried our sin, so we too can and must daily overcome and bury it. And as He is risen from the dead and lives, so we too can and must daily live a new life in Him.

872 **Rom. 6:3-4** Don't you know that all of us who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into His death? We were therefore buried

(Continued from page 1) PRESIDENT scraped completely clear. Little did my dad know I was watching him and being impressed upon by his habit, one that I now carry on as my habit. It makes me wonder if my kids do the same thing after observing me.

What do you do in your everyday life that may be observed by others? What behavior or habit of yours would your neighbors emulate once they observed you? Not ever knowing who is watching, what would others see?

As Christians, it is our utmost hope that others when they observe us, they see Jesus. We know, however, that it is our human condition that causes us to often fail to achieve that hope. What we may not know is that we are always being observed, and in many instances, we unknowingly could be showing others Jesus. Even more important, it may be the only Jesus they see. Understanding this, we should strive to be like Our Savior, and if we succeed, then people will see him in us. However, oftentimes people may see our religion. but they do not see Jesus. They may see our Sunday best, see us lifting our hands, hear us speaking hallelujahs, and view our attempts at piety but they may not feel our love for one another. We often get so wrapped up in judging souls that we forget to love them first. Even worse, we sometimes try to browbeat them with our righteousness instead of overwhelming them with our love.

Remember the "What Would Jesus Do" phenomenon of a few years back? It is still important today. When Our Lord was here in his three -year ministry, all he ever did was love. Jesus loved the poor, he loved the sick, he loved the convicted, and he even loved those who killed him. Understanding that is how others will see Jesus in us. What is it we should understand? We must love others for who they are, not what they are. Their color, their creed, their orientation, their denomination, in fact any-

thing that secular society uses to

define what makes us different from

each other are all meaningless when we look through the lens of love. Why? Because there is only one thing every human who has ever walked this Earth has in common, and there is only one thing who each one of us are - we are all a Child of God. When we only view one another as fellow children of the Almighty, we can love without condition, just as Jesus did. In doing so, those we are around will see that which we all should strive for, us being a picture of Jesus. Here at New Hope, we have a description of how we try to be that picture. It is an intent we state each week and therefore something that we are pledging to work on always. And that intent is found in one simple statement so familiar to all New Hopers -sharing God's gifts with all, proclaiming new hope in Jesus.

260. With which words do we regularly remember our Baptism?

The words "in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit" come from the baptismal command (Matt. 28:19) and are known as the Trinitarian Invocation. By repeating these words, in church or by ourselves, we recall, claim, and confess before heaven, earth, and hell all that God the Holy Trinity has given us in our Baptism.

873 Rom. 8:38-39 1 am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord. Bible narrative: The three persons of the blessed Trinity revealed themselves at the Baptism of our Lord (Luke 3:21-22).

Note: The Trinitarian Invocation may be accompanied by the sign of the cross, made at our Baptism upon our foreheads and hearts to mark us as "redeemed by Christ the crucified."

A Short Form for Holy Baptism in Cases of Emergency

In urgent cases, in the absence of a pastor, any Christian may administer Holy Baptism. Take water, call the person by name, and apply the water, saying: "I baptize you in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen."

If there is time, Baptism may be preceded by the Apostles' Creed and the Lord's Prayer.

We continue to share meditations to help us consider how to share God's love and glory with others. As the month of May begins, take some time to read this month's devotion about stewardship and God's gifts to us.

<u>Devotion 5</u> A Stewardship Devotion... Being Aware of God's Willingness to Give Luke 11:1-10

Have you ever been awakened in the middle of the night? Perhaps it was a telephone call, a knock on the door or the siren of an ambulance going by. As you know, it is a jarring experience. The first few seconds are a time of disorientation as you try to figure out what is going on. You may become concerned about someone's safety. You may experience a moment of fear as your reach for the telephone or go to the door.

This is the situation Jesus describes in this parable from Luke. What would you have done if you got to the door in the middle of the night and a neighbor was asking for food? Perhaps we'd be upset. However, Jesus is using this situation to illustrate our relationship with God. If a person would respond to the knock on the door because of the persistence of a neighbor, will not God, who does not slumber, answer our prayers? God is a like gracious and loving parent or friend, always there to listen and respond. Ask, and it will be given to you.

Jesus also uses this parable to describe God's willingness to provide. In the minds of many people, there is an unwritten rule of economics that "scarcity" will always be present. This "scarcity thinking" can often set the tone for many conversations and decisions. However, the Gospel radically subverts this as-

sumption. There may be a lack of resources in some circumstances, but there are also many assets. God does provide. Often there is more than enough available if we look for what God has provided. This provision is not a reward, but it is available so God's work can be done. What are the gifts or assets that God has given your congregation?

Within this parable there is also a message of God's willingness to share. Why?

Because through baptism we have been accepted into the Body of Christ. We are both servants and stewards. In Philippians (2:7) Paul describes how Christ "emptied himself, taking the form of a servant," and was obedient even to death. We have the privilege of sharing in the Body of Christ. Ours is a voluntary decision. God does not force us.

Lastly, God is ready to respond to our requests. Ask, and it will be given to you.

God has given us gifts and assets far beyond our understanding. Why is it then that we squander so much of our time and what God has given us? Because often we are only looking for what we want in life, not for what God is ready to provide. We look for the material and God offers the spiritual. We look for ourselves and God invites us to live for others. God is ready to give us what we ask for. Are willing servants ready to accept the responsibilities that accompany what God provides?

Unlike the visitor at the door, God does not pound a way into our life. God waits for us to respond. How is God knocking on your door today? Are you willing to receive and share what God is offering to you? Your willingness to receive can open the door to the next stage in your faith journey.

Let us pray: Provider God, we are often reluctant to respond to you invitation. We are caught up in our sleep, our daily activities and our relationship with things. May your Spirit startle us, as in the middle of the night, to see your presence and

your gifts. May we have an open heart to receive, and in so doing accept our responsibility to respond. May your Spirit guide us to share the resources you provide to do your will in our life, our congregation, our community and beyond. Amen.
