
Aug 3 will be the blessing of children and backpacks - bring your backpack to church Sunday. We will be praying over the children and adults going back to school!

Every once in a while I find myself ruminating on a piece of scripture in a curious sort of way. Not that ruminating on scripture is curious, rather I mean that I get curious about what I'm ruminating on. This happened recently with Philippians 4 and that oft-quoted passage:

Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

I don't know about you, but I am in desperate need of that peace that transcends understanding.

And so even though this is one of those verses that fades into the background of familiarity, I found myself wanting a piece of that peace badly enough that I took a second look. What, exactly, is it that I must do to get some of that peace?

We continue our review of God's Ten Commandments this month. As we all know, Christ issued the two great commandments during His time on earth. In Matthew 22, we read of Jesus' interaction with the Pharisees. All the Ten Commandments can be categorized within these two commandments and so for this year, we are going to look at the original Ten Commandments to see how Jesus captured all of them within His two great commandments. We thought, especially in the current world situation, with so many divisive forces encouraging us to build walls of prejudice and hate, centering our thoughts on these two commandments would help us to walk in Christ's way— remembering that Jesus came to save everyone and, because we want to follow in His path, we will want to follow His

commands and live our lives with these two commandments, and therefore the 10 Commandments of the Old Testament, as our focal point.

This month we look at the Seventh Commandment and the explanation that Luther wrote to help people understand its meaning.

The Seventh Commandment
You shall not steal.

What does this mean?

We should fear and love God so that we do not take our neighbor's money or possessions, or get them in any dishonest way, but help him to improve and protect his possessions and income.

Again, we are looking at the second great commandment, because, of course, God is helping us to consider the ways we need to treat our neighbor as our self. Each of these commandments that address specific behaviors in our daily living are simply summed up with the commandment to "love your neighbor as yourself." One of the great things about Luther's expla-

nations is that he fleshes out the fact that God thinks about these exact statements in a much broader sense. As with the fifth commandment, God is telling us that stealing is beyond the simple act of robbing someone and looks to dishonesty to others in any form.

Treating others with respect is the model Jesus lived throughout His life on earth.

to God can feel all-consuming. How can we think of anything else when our request looms so large before us? But genuinely meditating on the things we are grateful for is the first step to asking God with thanksgiving.

This aspect of thanksgiving expresses trust that God is answering our plea in the best possible way, recognizing His wisdom and His timing and His providence. Even when we do not see positive change, we can know that God is working behind the scenes. And along the way we can thank God for the small progresses, the small hopes, the small glimpses that He is indeed working all things together for our good.

With grateful boldness.

Our Father does not want us to ask in a sniveling, unworthy kind of way. Instead, Jesus said, ask and it will be given to you. If you who are sinners know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your Father in heaven give to you all that you need?

Boldly approach the throne of grace. As children of God we have been given a deep assurance of the Father's love for us. He wants us to come to Him with every prayer and petition, knowing that He will hear us. Be bold.

Our Father has given us the promise that we can come to Him with every request and need. Let us lay our request before him with Thanksgiving.








For the first part of the year we have looked at the church and the beliefs that guide the ELCA. This month we want to focus on the service project that the ELCA encourages all of the churches within the ELCA to participate in annually, in September, "God's work. Our hands." To learn more about this, we want to share information from the district:

Together in Jesus Christ we are freed by grace to live faithfully, witness boldly and serve joyfully. Scheduled for Sept. 7, "God's work. Our hands." is our annual day of service and an opportunity to celebrate who we are as the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) — one church, freed in Christ to love and serve our neighbor. The ELCA's first dedicated day of service in September 2013 was held to celebrate the church's 25th anniversary. Through the years we have embraced "God's work. Our

hands." as a way to be church together. On this day we bear witness to the love and concern God's people have for one another. Our congregations do this work every day — loving their neighbors and improving their communities. These acts of service allow us to explore one of our most basic Lutheran convictions: All of life in Jesus Christ — every act of service, in every daily calling, in every corner of life — flows freely from a living, daring confidence in God's grace. This year we are especially mindful of the challenges faced by our Lutheran social service organizations and other faith-based and human service organizations due to the reduction in federal funding. We encourage you to consider service opportunities with these agencies as you begin to make your plans. Mark your congregation's calendar for Sunday, Sept. 7. If your congregation cannot participate on Sept. 7, please find another time that works best. "God's work. Our hands." Every day. The service day should not be seen as replacing worship. You are encouraged to host your service event after worship, or you and your congregation can arrange for a brief worship service at the site where you're serving and welcome others to worship with you. 
