

I had the pleasure of sitting with a centenarian this past month. At 105 years young, she asked about the weather, asked about my family, and wanted to know what I carried in my backpack. When I told her it was my Bible because I just came from Bible Study, she smiled and said, "Oh yes, that's good to keep with you." As I visited with her, I could only help but think of all the things she has witnessed in her life. She has seen and lived through things we today, in 2025, teach in school history classes. She was born after one World War had ended and grew up as another was to begin. She lived through the Great Depression, the completion of the Empire State building and the building of the Hoover Dam! She came into adulthood in the height of Prohibition. She has lived through multiple inventions - including personal computers and phones, multiple presidents, indoor plumbing and electricity, the completion of several roads and bridges, and now she witnesses the use of AI - artificial intelligence being used for her own health care. She often tells me that "life has had its ups and downs, but what do you do but just go with the flow" and keep following Jesus. Her courage and humility right my own skewed thinking. As I visit with her, she is a gentle reminder that living through the unknown is scary but when we keep focused on Jesus, it's much easier to take one step at a time no matter how dark the world seems around us. 




Mible Study! Anyone interested in a Zoom Bible Study please let Pastor know. We are looking to do a 4-week Bible study during the evening so more people can participate.

The Price and Cost of the Ultimate Freedom

Unless you're an accountant, you've probably never thought about the difference between price and cost.

I didn't until today.

But while we may use the words interchangeably, there is a notable difference. Cost is what it takes to produce something; price is what someone pays for it.

This is straight forward when we're talking about gadgets and gizmos. It becomes more interesting when we start talking about less tangible things.

We continue our review of God's Ten Commandments this month. As we all know, Christ issued the two great commandments during His time on earth. In Matthew 22, we read of Jesus' interaction with the Pharisees. All the Ten Commandments can be categorized within these two commandments and so for this year, we are going to look at the original Ten Commandments to see how Jesus captured all of them within His two great commandments. We thought, especially in the current world situation, with so many divisive forces encouraging us to build walls of prejudice and hate, centering our thoughts on these two commandments would help us to walk in Christ's way— remembering that Jesus came to save everyone and. because we want to follow in His path, we will want to follow His comStates. It's a time when we reflect on all the costs that have gone into the freedoms we enjoy. It is also a time to reflect on what price we are willing to pay to maintain it. Freedom, as the saying goes, is not free.

It has a cost. And a price.
This is true for the freedom of political sovereignty, and it is true for the most foundational freedom we possess.

The cost of a country's freedom is high. So is the cost of divine freedom; free will.

Free will, it seems to me, has messed up a lot of things. It has unleashed war, poverty, cruelty, and confusion. It has allowed evil to run rampant in our world. It has allowed people to make terrible decisions that led to terrible consequences on personal and global scales.

It seems like we have unwillingly paid an awful price for our free will.

Yet, there must be something more. When God created us, He could have created automatons that would always do his good, perfect and pleasing will. But He didn't. He gave us free will.

Even now the question remains: why does God allow so much evil to run rampant? Why doesn't He step in and *stop it*?

The first answer is: He did.
"In this world you will have
trouble," Jesus said. "But take heart. I
have overcome the world." (John
16:33)

God paid the price of sin so that we can enter a peaceful eternity with Him. He *did* stop the evil. But we don't get to see the full manifestation until we get to heaven.

Perhaps that should be enough of an answer, but if you wrestle with questions like this as much as I do, then you might also wonder why we have to wait. Why doesn't He step in and just stop the evil here and now?

The second answer I see is: free will.

In order for evil to be removed, God would have to prevent humans from acting on the evil SEE JANET (Continued on page 4)

mands and live our lives with these two commandments, and therefore the 10 Commandments of the Old Testament, as our focal point.

This month, the Ninth Commandment:

The Ninth Commandment
You shall not covet your neighbor's house.

What does this mean?

We should fear and love God so that we do not scheme to get our neighbor's inheritance or house, or get it in a way which only appears right, but help and be of service to him in keeping it.

We again reference the Second great commandment as we consider yet another way in which we should treat our neighbor. As with all of the commandments, 4-10, God is giving specific directions regarding the way we treat the others in our life. We of course, know that "neighbor" refers to those around us and not just the people in our neighborhood. But in this commandment, God directs us

to treat others with the respect they deserve regarding their home and possessions.

Hospitality Matters

"...extend hospitality to strangers." Romans 12:13b We all know what genuine hospitality feels like when we experience it as a guest. It feels like you, as the new person, are cared for...because your hosts have taken the time to anticipate and meet as many of your needs and questions as possible.

In the church, being intentional about hospitality sends the message that those who are new to the community matter just as much as those who have been there a long time.

Hospitality is the practice of seeing and removing the barriers that make people feel like "outsiders." Ultimately, the goal is community; to help the stranger feel just as important and loved as those who have been there a long time

- (4) How else might your congregation "extend hospitality to strangers," putting them at ease?
- (5) Which partners or friends do you know in the community who could be "secret shoppers," and enter your physical or digital space as an "outsider," providing your congregation with important feedback?



We have recently finished two outreach projects for our community. The first project was to provide teen study Bibles for the Fellowship of Christian Athletes at North White High School. On September 4th, Bob Hickman and Pastor Candice made a presentation to the club, during their weekly meeting at the school. The group received 10 study Bibles and a check

for them to use, as needed, to support their program.

The second project was a collection in support of the Honey Creek Volunteer Fire Department. We held the "Fill the Boot" fund raiser during the summer months and successfully collected \$508 for the department. Our goal had been to collect enough money to buy a pair of boots, one of the numerous items needed by each department member. As we learned, the cost of funding the needed equipment for each member is well over \$2000.00 and New Hope, with the support of the Reynolds community, were happy to be able to do a small part in providing funds for this vital equipment.

Navigating the "Golden Years"

This month we continue our series on Eldercare. This month we are learning about ways to prevent identity theft.

What Is Identity Theft?

Identity theft is when a malicious person uses any element of your identity for their own gain. Identity theft includes someone accessing your banking passwords and stealing your money directly, or someone using your social security number to open a line of credit in your name that they have access to, ruining both your credit score and your ability to take out loans or buy or rent property in the future.

1. Invest in an identity theft protection service

Purchasing an identity theft protection service may seem like an obvious prevention method, but it can't be understated!

2. Collect mail daily

Some of the ways that criminals steal your identity are decidedly low-tech, and the solutions that stop them are equally straightforward. Try to collect your mail every day. If you know when your mail is usually delivered and you're able to grab it within the hour, that's even better. You should keep track of unexpected mail that doesn't arrive, and place mail holds with USPS if you're going to be away for more

than 24 hours.

3. Review credit card and bank statements regularly

Financial identity theft is often caught when reviewing credit cards and bank statements. In fact, credit card fraud is the most common type of identity theft.

4. Freeze your credit

When you freeze your credit, no one – including you! – can look at or request your credit report. That means no one can open an account, apply for a loan, or get a new credit card while your credit is frozen. Credit freezes are free, won't impact your credit score, and are easily reversible.

5. Create different passwords for your accounts

We know. You want to remember your passwords and having the same old memorable words is the easiest way to set up a new account and not get immediately locked out. We promise it's not worth it!

6. Shred documents containing personal information before disposing of them

Remember document shredders? They used to be ubiquitous in work settings, and now they seem to be a thing of the past – but they shouldn't be!

7. Install antivirus or other protection software

Viruses and malware are adept at seeking out personal information on your devices without you even knowing they're there.

8. Enable two-factor authentica-

tion on devices and accounts

Two-factor authentication, a system that requires two distinct forms of verification, such as a username and password plus SMS text verification, can feel annoying, but those extra seconds of verification can be a life-saver.

9. Opt-out of prescreened credit card offers

That junk mail that shows up from every bank you've ever heard of is more than just annoying, it leaves you at risk.

10. Review credit reports annually Everyone is entitled by law to a free credit report from each of the major credit bureaus annually, and you should take advantage of that perk! Accessing your yearly reports won't affect your credit score, and the online portals from Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion make it pretty easy.

11. Wipe electronics before donating

There are many options for what to do with your old electronics, but regardless of if you are selling, donating, or recycling them, wiping all of your personal data off of the device is a nonnegotiable. Even deleted files aren't really gone. Parts of those files can be reassembled with data recovery programs up until they are overwritten.

Why Donations Are Important


- Impact on Development: Access to proper clothing is vital for a child's well-being, confidence, and ability to participate fully in school and social activities.

The month of October is a busy month! We celebrate the Fall, Halloween, Reformation, and Clergy Appreciation Month. As we begin this month, we take some time to reflect on two topics close to the heart of our New Hope family, the Reformation and Clergy Appreciation.



The Reformation: We are Saved by faith in the Triune

God alone

Many things are attributed to Martin Luther, the person we recognize as the Father of the Lutheran Church. But as with all famous people and events, we need to examine information that are considered facts, to insure that time hasn't shaded those facts. With that in mind here are some pieces of information about Martin Luther that we are going to examine as "Myth or Truth."

Luther got the melody for "A Mighty Fortress" (or other hymns) from a barroom.

Here, perhaps, truth is stranger than fiction. The association with "bars" comes from a mistaken understanding of a term modern hymnologists use to describe the form of Luther's hymnody: "bar form."

Bar form simply means that the melody would begin with a theme repeated once before introducing a secondary theme and then ending with the last part of the original theme — rather like A-B, A-B, C, B. "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God" (Evangelical Lutheran Worship, 503-505) is just such a melody. Now a great many of Lu-

ther's tunes come from medieval modes and chants that he slightly revised to fit the rhymed German hymns he was producing. For example, he reworked an Advent hymn attributed to Ambrose of Milan, "Savior of the Nations, Come" (ELW, 263), setting the German translation to a medieval chant.

But some of Luther's original hymn tunes were criticized for being too upbeat. He was one of the first to employ a major key for some of his hymns, including "A Mighty Fortress." One scholar notes that Luther's opponents complained about another such hymn, "Dear Christians, One and All, Rejoice" (ELW, 594) for being far too joyous a melody to be sung in church.

Such melodies that Luther, and quickly other Lutheran Christians, used sometimes had their origins in dance melodies and folk tunes — but probably not bars.

Luther invented the Christmas tree.

Of course, every age reinvents historical figures to serve their times. In this case, a famous 19th-century etching showing Luther and his family sitting around a Christmas tree rewrote history.

In Luther's day the home Christmas tree had not yet been invented. Only in the 19th century do we find this practice spreading — first in Lutheran and Roman Catholic lands, and then in the U.S., from German and Scandinavian immigrants to others. Because of his well-known Christmas hymn "From Heaven Above" (ELW, 268), Luther was often associated with Christmas practices he had never heard of — the tree, the Advent wreath and, in this country, even "Away in the Manger" (ELW, 277).






